#### **Infrastructure Framework Update**

On September 27<sup>th</sup>, House Speaker Nancy Pelosi (D-CA) delayed a vote on the "Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act" (IIJA), the \$550 billion bipartisan infrastructure framework. Pelosi and Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer (D-NY) stated that both chambers are now working to strike a deal on the infrastructure package by October 31<sup>st</sup>. Moderate Democrats are upset with Speaker Pelosi for not fulfilling her original promise of bringing the IIJA to the House floor for a vote on September 27<sup>th</sup>. The bipartisan infrastructure package includes \$55 billion for drinking water and clean water programs administered by the Environmental Protection Agency, including funds for the Clean Water and Drinking Water SRF's at \$23.4 billion over five years. The legislation also includes \$8.3 billion in Bureau of Reclamation administered western water programs, including \$550 million for Title XVI projects and \$400 million for WaterSMART grants.

On October 1<sup>st</sup>, President Biden met with House and Senate leadership and members of the Democratic Caucus and insisted that the bipartisan infrastructure package should not be voted on until a deal is struck on his social infrastructure reconciliation package, the "Build Back Better Act." The Congressional Democratic caucus has discussed reducing the original \$3.5 trillion price tag of the reconciliation package to a number in the \$2 trillion range. The White House has stated that the target range is \$1.9 trillion to \$2.3 trillion. President Biden said that negotiating the reconciliation package could take weeks and reiterated that the IIJA should not be voted on until the Senate advances a reconciliation package.

The current Build Back Better Act includes some key water funding and tax provisions, such as the following:

- \$500 million in emergency western drought funding to Bureau of Reclamation
- \$125 million for the EPA Alternative Water Source grant program
- \$2 billion for Sewer Overflow and Stormwater Reuse program
- \$500 million for the Department of Health and Human Services' (LIHWAP) low-income drinking/wastewater ratepayer assistance

- \$500 million for the Community Water System Risk and Resilience grant program (This EPA administered program is for community water systems serving a population greater than 3,300)
- \$450 million for installation, repair, or replacement of domestic septic systems, including investments in connecting households with failing septic systems public sewer systems
- Water conservation tax parity rebate provision (excludes from gross income water conservation, storm water management, and wastewater management subsidies provided by public utilities, or storm water management providers).
- Restoration of tax-exempt advance refunding bonds

#### **Congress Passes Continuing Resolution**

On September 30<sup>th</sup>, Congress passed a Continuing Resolution which averted a government shutdown. President Biden signed the bill that same day, which temporarily extends federal funding through December 3<sup>rd</sup>. The bill contained \$200 million in emergency funding to the Bureau of Reclamation for activities to address the western-wide drought.

#### **Debt Limit Issue Resolved...For Now**

According to Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen, the existing U.S. debt limit is on track to be breached on or around October 18<sup>th</sup>. Not raising or suspending the debt limit would likely have calamitous impacts on the U.S. economy. The Senate agreed to temporarily increase the debt limit from \$480 billion to \$28.9 trillion until December 3<sup>rd</sup>, the same day the continuing resolution will end, to avert a default on U.S. debt obligations. While Senate Republicans previously blocked Democrats' efforts to suspend the debt limit for a longer period, neither party has an agreement on a long-term strategy. Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnel (R-KY) has stated that Republicans are insistent that Democrats will have to work without Republican support to raise the debt ceiling after December 3<sup>rd</sup>. The House is slated to pass the debt limit extension on or about October 10<sup>th</sup>.

#### **House Transportation and Infrastructure Hearing on PFAS**

The House Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, Subcommittee on Water and Environment, held a hearing on October 6<sup>th</sup> to examine the effects of PFAS substances on public health and water quality. Subcommittee Chair Grace Napolitano (D-CA) expressed concern over the potential negative effects of PFAS on human and aquatic ecosystems. PFAS contamination has been a high priority for the Biden Administration's EPA, which has already created a PFAS Council to shape a formal action plan to address the contamination. The EPA is expected to release an outline of the action plan this month, though it will likely focus more on drinking water.

#### **Senate Energy and Natural Resources Hearing**

On October 6<sup>th</sup>, the Senate Energy and Natural Resources Committee, Subcommittee on Water & Power, held a hearing to examine the status and management of drought in the western U.S. The Assistant Secretary for the Office of Water and Science at the Interior, Tanya Trujillo,

testified in the hearing and expressed concern over the government's shortage declaration for the Colorado River.

Biden Administration Requests Reinitiation of Consultation on Operation of the CVP & SWP On Friday, October 1<sup>st</sup>, the Bureau of Reclamation (Reclamation) requested reinitiation of an Endangered Species Act Section 7 consultation with the U.S Fish and Wildlife (FWS) and National Marine Fisheries Services (NMFS) on 2019 biological statements regarding the coordinated long-term operation of the Central Valley Project and State Water Project. Reclamation's Mid-Pacific Regional Director Ernest Conant stated in a letter to his counterparts at the FWS and NMFS that the "reinitiation is warranted based on anticipated modifications to the Proposed Action that may cause effects to listed species or designated critical habitats not analyzed in the Biological Opinions dated Oct. 21, 2019."

California's eleven-member House Republican delegation condemned the decision which they asserted will delay water flow to the Central Valley. In a release dated October 2<sup>nd</sup>, the House members stated: "We strongly oppose the Biden administration's reckless, anti-scientific, and politically-motivated attempt to rewrite the 2019 biological opinions." These members further said the 2019 opinions reflected years of work by career staff experts at the U.S. Department of the Interior and the U.S. Department of Commerce, incorporating the latest data available to ensure a reliable supply of water.

#### **USBR Commissioner Nominee Vote**

On September 21<sup>st</sup>, the Senate Energy and Commerce Committee voted to advance Camille Touton Calimlim to be the Commissioner of the Bureau of Reclamation. The next step for Touton is a vote from the full Senate for approval. Touton has extensive experience in the private and public sectors and immense qualifications for the role.

#### FY2022 House NDAA Reauthorization Requires PFAS Cleanup to State Standards

The House recently passed its version of the FY2022 National Defense Authorization Act NDAA) legislation (H.R. 4350). Like last year's House version, the bill includes a provision to require DoD to clean up PFAS contamination to State-required levels. The Senate concluded committee action on its version of the FY2022 NDAA reauthorization in late July, but that legislation did not contain a similar provision. Senate floor action on the FY2022 NDAA is planned for this month.

The Governors bill signing period ended on Sunday, October 10<sup>th</sup> at midnight. This year the Governor had a total of 836 bills sent to his desk. The Governor signed a total 772 bills and vetoed 66 bills. The Governor' signature rate was at 92% for the year and his veto rate was 7.9%. Bills that were signed by the Governor will take effect on January 1, 2022. Should the bill have an "urgency clause" it would then take effect immediately.

Furthermore, given this year's historic budget, there are several workshops, comment periods, and draft programs being developed at the regulatory agencies. Due to the various programs and funding allocations, CalAd has begun meeting with key agency staff to better understand how to best position SCVWA for different funding priorities such as PFAS, habitat restoration, groundwater wells, recycled water, and zero-emission vehicles and charging infrastructure. It is our goal to work with SCVWA leadership to identify priorities and help position them for success in the grant funding process.

#### **State Water Contractors - Subsidence Funding**

As previously discussed, SB 559 (Hurtado) was significantly amended coming off the Assembly Appropriations Committee "Suspense File." The amendments outlined below were added into the bill by the Assembly Appropriations committee, against the author's desire:

- Delete legislative intent language.
- Require the Department of Water Resources (DWR) to ensure funding supports public benefits, in consultation with the State Water Resources Control Board and Department of Fish and Wildlife.
- Ensure accountability for funding, particularly for federal projects.
- Require the DWR Director to apportion funding among the identified conveyance projects based on certain factors.
- Require beneficiaries to pursue recovery of restoration costs from responsible parties.

The author and the bill sponsors made a strategic decision to "park" the bill on the Assembly Floor, turning the legislation into a two-year bill. The author will work with the Governor's Administration and Assembly leadership to seek a resolution with the bill language. However, it should be noted that the Legislature has funded this conveyance project in the budget at \$100

million dollars, with a commitment for an additional \$100 million next year. The Budget funding has been approved and signed by the Governor.

## SB 559 (Hurtado) Department of Water Resources: water conveyance systems: Canal Conveyance Capacity Restoration Fund.

This bill establishes the Canal Conveyance Capacity Restoration Fund in the State Treasury to be administered by the Department of Water Resources. Funds are to be expended in support of subsidence repair costs, including environmental planning, permitting, design, and construction and necessary road and bridge upgrades required to accommodate capacity improvements. The bill directs funds to restore the capacity of 4 specified water conveyance systems, with 2 of those 4 expenditures being in the form of a grant to the Friant Water Authority and to the San Luis and Delta-Mendota Water Authority.

Status: Assembly Floor, Inactive File

#### **Water Affordability Assistance**

The author of this bill and the stakeholders worked diligently through the entire legislative process to reach agreements on several provisions in the legislation. However, a significant piece required for the bill to become operative was a "funding source." Unfortunately, the author was unable to resolve this issue.

Additionally, during the final week of the legislative session, the Governor's office requested that the Senator "hold" the bill and continue to work on the legislation through the Fall. The author agreed and moved the bill to the Assembly Floor's Inactive Fie. The author's office would like to move the bill early next year, if possible.

#### SB 222 (Dodd) Water Affordability Assistance Program.

This bill would establish the Water Affordability Assistance Fund in the State Treasury to help provide water affordability assistance, for both drinking water and wastewater services, to low-income ratepayers and ratepayers experiencing economic hardship in California. This bill will only become operative if an appropriation in the annual Budget Act or another statute occurs.

Status: Assembly Floor, Inactive File Position: Oppose Unless Amended

#### **Legislative Tracking**

#### SB 223 (Dodd) Discontinuation of residential water service.

The bill would require the State Water Resources Control Board (Board) to provide technical assistance to very small community water systems. The bill would require the Board to establish a bridge loan program to assist very small community water systems that may suffer revenue loss or delayed collection while complying. To the extent funding is available, partial loan forgiveness would be made available to systems that offer debt forgiveness to low-income residents with past due accounts. This bill would also require an urban water supplier and an urban and community water system to update policies to comply this chapter by July 1, 2022.

Status: Senate Appropriations Committee – "Held" on the Suspense File. Two-year bill.

**Position: Watch** 

#### SB 230 (Portantino) State Water Resources Control Board: Constituents of Emerging Concern

This bill would require the State Water Resources Control Board to establish, maintain, and direct an ongoing, dedicated program called the Constituents of Emerging Concern Program to assess the state of information and recommend areas for further study on the occurrence of constituents of emerging concern (CEC) in drinking water sources and treated drinking water. The bill would require the state board to convene the Science Advisory Panel to review and provide recommendations to the state board on CEC for further action.

Status: Two-year bill Position: Support

#### SB 323 (Caballero) Local government: water or sewer service: legal actions.

This bill would authorize a local agency or interested person to bring a validation action in a superior court to determine the validity of a fee or charge for water and sewer service. The proposal would require an interested party bring an action within 120 days after the local agency adopts the fee or charge.

Status: Signed by the Governor.

**Position: Support** 

## SB 626 (Dodd) Construction Manager/General Contractor Procurement Method: Department of Water Resources.

This bill would give Department of Water Resources the ability to use Design Build and Construction Manager/General Contractor (CM/GC) procurement processes for construction contracts. This authority would accelerate project delivery and allow DWR to advance critical public safety, infrastructure, and habitat restoration projects in a more expeditious and efficient manner.

Status: Signed by the Governor.

**Position: Support** 

#### AB 377 (Rivas) Water quality: impaired waters.

This bill would require all California surface waters to be fishable, swimmable, and drinkable by January 1, 2050. The bill would prohibit the state board and regional boards from authorizing an NPDES discharge, waste discharge requirement, or waiver of a waste discharge requirement that causes or contributes to an exceedance of a water quality standard, or from authorizing a best management practice permit term to authorize a discharge that causes or contributes to an exceedance of a water quality standard in receiving waters. The bill would prohibit, on or after January 1, 2030, a regional water quality control plan from including a schedule for implementation for achieving a water quality standard that was adopted as of January 1, 2021 and would prohibit a regional water quality control plan from including a schedule for implementation of a water quality standard that is adopted after January 1, 2021.

Status: Two-year bill Position: Oppose

AB 979 (Frazier) Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta: projects: sea level rise analysis report.

This bill requires an entity undertaking a project in the Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta to complete a report analyzing the impact of current sea-level rise projections on the project.

Status: Assembly Appropriations Committee - "Held" on the Suspense File. Two-year bill.

**Position: Oppose** 

AB 1434 Urban water use objectives: indoor residential water use.

This bill lowers the indoor residential water use standard from 55 gallons per capita daily (gpcd) to 48 gpcd beginning January 1, 2023, from 52.5 gpcd to 44 gpcd beginning January 1, 2025, and from 50 gpcd to 40 gpcd beginning January 1, 2030.

Status: Two-Year bill Position: Oppose

#### **Utilities**

SB 52 (Dodd) State of emergency: local emergency: sudden and severe energy shortage: planned power outage.

This bill would expand the definition of "sudden and severe energy shortage" to include a "deenergization event," as a planned power outage and would make a deenergization event one of those conditions constituting a state of emergency and a local emergency.

Status: Signed by the Governor.

**Position: Watch** 

AB 1161 (E. Garcia) Electricity: eligible renewable energy and zero-carbon resources: state agencies: procurement.

This bill would enact the Clean Economy and Clean Jobs Stimulus Act of 2021 and would require the Department of Water Resources to procure newly developed eligible renewable energy resources or zero-carbon resources and energy storage in an amount that satisfies 100 percent of the electricity procured to serve all state agencies by December 31, 2030.

Status: Two-year bill Position: Oppose

#### **Local Government**

AB 339 (Lee) State and local government: open meetings.

This bill requires, until December 31, 2023, that city councils and boards of supervisors in jurisdictions with over 250,000 residents provide both in-person and teleconference options for the public to attend their meetings. This bill will sunset on December 31, 2023.

Status: This bill was vetoed by the Governor.

**Position: Watch** 

AB 361 (Rivas) Open meetings: state and local agencies: teleconferences.

This bill builds upon the Governor's Executive Orders, allowing local legislative bodies to meet remotely during a state of emergency, as declared by the Governor, until January 2024.

Additionally, this bill extends the current EO that enables state agencies and CSU boards to meet remotely for the next four months until January 2022. This bill had an "Urgency Clause" added and was supposed to take effect immediately upon signature by the Governor.

The Governor issued an Executive Order waiving the application of AB 361 until October 1, 2021, when the provisions of a prior executive order that established requirements for public agencies to meet remotely during the COVID-19 emergency will expire.

Status: Signed by the Governor.

**Position: Watch** 

#### AB 703 (Rubio) Open meetings: local agencies: teleconferences.

This bill will eliminate the previously existing concept of "teleconference locations"; will revise existing law to ensure minimum standards for public participation; and will revise notice requirements to allow for greater public participation in teleconference meetings of local agencies. The bill does not require teleconferencing but modernizes existing law to ensure greater public participation in meetings of the legislative bodies of local agencies which choose to utilize teleconferencing.

Status: Two-year bill Position: Watch

#### **Budget**

During the last week of the legislative session, the Legislature passed the final pieces of the 2021/22 State Budget. Closing out this budget included an additional Budget Bill Jr., SB 170, making final budget adjustments and settling major outstanding budget packages in water and drought, wildfire prevention, and climate resiliency. Also, 15 additional trailer bills that added details and made edits to existing budget bills. Of the Budget trailer bills, SB 155 "Resources" has provisions of importance to SCVWA. Below is a summary of the highlights from the Budget Bill Jr, SB 170, and the Resources trailer bill SB 155. Both bills have been signed by the Governor.

#### SB 170 - Budget Bill Jr.

#### **Water and Drought Package**

Provides \$4.6 billion over three years to respond to drought conditions and invest in a more resilient water future with funding for water recycling, sustainable groundwater management, cleaning up toxic contaminants, restoration of the Salton Sea and Clear Lake, and preventing flooding.

#### **Wildfire Prevention Package**

In addition to the \$536 million early action package, the budget provides \$988 million for wildfire prevention and forest health in the fiscal year 2021-2022. This equals a \$1.5 billion investment in this year alone to protect California's communities and wildlands from historic wildfires exacerbated by climate change and drought conditions. This budget also extends the

state's commitment to funding these efforts in the future by continuously appropriating \$200 million a year from the Greenhouse Gas
Reduction Fund until the fiscal year 2028-2029.

#### **Climate Resiliency Package**

Provides \$3.688 billion over three years to make needed climate resiliency investments or about \$2.5 billion more than what was proposed in the Governor's May Revision. A \$369 million down payment in this fiscal year provides funding to help plan for regional adaptation investments, plant trees to reduce extreme heat, increase air quality, and build healthy and sustainable communities with the Transformative Climate Communities program. Future investments will respond to extreme heat, build community resource centers, address sea-level rise, and help reach California's commitment to conserve at least 30 percent of California's land and coastal waters by 2030.

#### SB 155 – Resources Trailer Bill

#### Safe and Affordable Drinking Water (SADW) Eligibility

Expands the list of eligible funding recipients to include technical assistance providers and provides that a privately owned public utility may serve as a technical assistance provider.

#### **Water Arrearages**

Prohibits, until December 31, 2021, all community water systems from discontinuing water service to customers due to nonpayment.

#### California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) Biodiversity

Exempts from CEQA projects that conserve, restore, protect, or enhance, and assist in the recovery of California native fish and wildlife, habitat upon which they depend or that restore or provide habitat for California native fish and wildlife, until January 1, 2025.

#### **Bonds**

Both bond proposals bills have been put to a halt for the immediate future. The Senate moved their bond proposal to the Senate Floor "Inactive File" and the Assembly moved their bond proposal to the Assembly Rules Committee. At this time both bills will be held until leadership in both houses decides to move forward with each proposal in the legislative process. To make it on the November 2022 ballot, either bill must pass the Legislature before June 2022.

## SB 45 (Portantino) Wildfire Prevention, Safe Drinking Water, Drought Preparation, and Flood Protection Bond Act of 2022.

This bill would enact the Wildfire Prevention, Safe Drinking Water, Drought Preparation, and Flood Protection Bond Act of 2022, which, if approved by the voters, would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$5,510,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for a wildfire prevention, safe drinking water, drought preparation, and flood protection program.

## AB 1500 (E. Garcia) Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparation, Flood Protection, Extreme Heat Mitigation, and Workforce Development Bond Act of 2022.

This bill would enact the Safe Drinking Water, Wildfire Prevention, Drought Preparation, Flood Protection, Extreme Heat Mitigation, and Workforce Development Bond Act of 2022, which, if approved by the voters, would authorize the issuance of bonds in the amount of \$6,700,000,000 pursuant to the State General Obligation Bond Law to finance projects for safe drinking water, wildfire prevention, drought preparation, flood protection, extreme heat mitigation, and workforce development programs.

#### Regulatory

• State Water Board Adopts Guidelines for Paying off Pandemic-Related Water Bill Debt.

The State Water Resources Control Board adopted guidelines that will determine how the agency will administer the \$1 billion financial relief program for community water systems' unpaid water bill debt from residential and commercial customers who were unable to pay their bills due to COVID-related financial hardship. The California Water and Wastewater Arrearages Payment Program will disburse funds between November 1, 2021 and January 31, 2022, prioritizing small drinking water systems first. Water systems must apply for the funding, which covers residential and commercial accounts that are 60 days or more behind on payments for debt accrued between March 4, 2020 and June 15, 2021. As a condition of receiving the funds, participating systems must credit their customers' accounts and notify them that their water bill debt has been cleared or reduced. Customers will not be paid directly. Pending budget legislation negotiated by the Administration and the Legislature would extend the moratorium on water shutoffs to December 31, 2021. **SUBJECT:** Review of Outreach on Rent and Utility Relief Program

#### **SUMMARY**

Various state and federal programs have been made available to help people who have fallen behind in rent and utilities for reasons related to the COVID-19 pandemic. While there was some confusion when they first rolled out earlier this year, SCV Water has used our communication channels to let our customers know of these resources. This discussion will cover the CA COVID Rent (and utility) Relief Program, and the CA Water and Wastewater Arrearages Payment Program, and the past and upcoming outreach efforts.

#### **DISCUSSION**

Staff will share a PowerPoint presentation with more details, but below is a high-level summary.

#### **CA COVID-19 RENT RELIEF**

This program provides up to 100% for past due rent and utilities for income-eligible renters and landlords, and covers April 1, 2020, through September 30, 2021. The program is managed by the state. There was some confusion early on when, although the program description included utilities, the home page of the website and early collateral materials only referenced "rent relief". Utilities were called out in the most recent materials provided.

#### **CA Water and Wastewater Arrearages Payment Program**

Through \$985 million in federal funding allocated by the state legislature, the State Water Board has created a new program to provide relief to community water and wastewater systems for unpaid bills related to the pandemic. The funding will cover water debt from residential and commercial customers accrued between March 4, 2020 and June 15, 2021.

The Program will initially prioritize drinking water residential and commercial arrearages. Funding to community water systems will be disbursed through January 31, 2022. If the Program still has funding available, it will extend to wastewater residential and commercial arrearages by February 2022.
