

On February 17 and 18, 2021, I attended the Urban Water Institute 2021 Virtual Spring Conference. The sessions I attended and selected points of interest were as follows:

## 2/17, 1:00 PM Session; Capital / DC Report

Anne Deister, UWI Executive Director, Introductory remarks Eric Sapperstien, ENS Resources, Washington DC Report Eric O'Donnell, Townsend Public Affairs, Sacramento Report Points of Interest:

- First 100 days in DC, the focus is on COVID19, economy, executive orders, nominations / organization
- Beyond April 30 in DC, the focus on economic recovery, infrastructure, environmental justice, taxes
- In Sacramento, this is the first year of the next two-year session
- Sacramento priorities: COVID 19 response, wildfire prevention, climate change, broadband infrastructure, public safety, social justice, housing
- Democrats have a super majority in both house in Sacramento, and thus do not need any Republican votes to pass their agenda.

2/17, 2:00 PM Session; Update on Delta Conveyance Matt Stone, GM SCVWA, moderator Karla Nemeth, Director, DWR Jennifer Pierre, SWC Executive Director Steve Arakawa, MWD Tom McCarthy, GM KCoWA

This was an excellent panel, and Mr. Stone did an excellent job moderating.

- Karla Nemeth provided a detailed update on the status of the project in multiple areas and emphasized the benefits when considering climate change and when the needs of SGMA are considered. The changes in the Feral Administration will be supportive.
- Jennifer Pierre provided and overview of the SWP Contractors and a regional overview. Ms. Pierre presented a "Value Proposition," showing that support for Delta Conveyance = support for the SWC and its benefits.
- Steve Arakawa and Tom McCarthy made persuasive arguments in support of Delta Conveyand for MWD and KCoWA.
