On November 1, 2018, I attended two CSDA committee meetings held at its headquarters located at 1121 I Street, Sacramento.

Member Services Committee (30 attendees)

Staff introduced a new online member benefit program called *GovDeals*. *GovDeals* provides services to various government agencies that allow them to sell surplus and confiscated items via the Internet. Each participating agency has its own auction rules and regulations and may be subject to government ordinances. It sells everything from vehicles, equipment, trains, plaques on bridges, etc.

- Membership Retention is solid at 97.8% (98% was goal). Currently CSDA has 1,058 regular/associate members
- Through its <u>online communities</u> blog, CSDA has developed a comprehensive Samply Policy Handbook and is working to update its Member Handbook.
- Marketing. Next year is CSDA 50th anniversary and it is offering 58 Membership Marketing Events

Professional Development Committee (30 attendees)

As of Oct 2018, CSDA held 40 workshop (946 attendees); 30 webinars (1,098 attendees) and on-demand webinars (1,153 attendees). Over 75% rated the Annual Conference at Excellent or Very Good.

On November 2, 2018, I attend <u>CSDA's Legislative Committee Meeting</u> held at SMUD's headquarters located at 6301 S. Street, Sacramento, CA 95817. Over 55 members and guests were present.

The committee examined the results of survey for CSDA Legislative Priorities for 2019. Categories included:

Environment District Formation, Dissolution and Reorganization

Governance Human Resources and Personnel

Public Works and Facilities Revenue

The committee broke into seven working groups in an attempt to narrow the issues down to 5 major areas for CSDA to pursue in 2019

The committee consider Legislative Proposals for 2019:

- Change the requirement that construction projects costing over \$35,000 must be
 posted in newspapers, at least twice, which is costing and not the most effective or
 efficient means.
- Change the requirement that special district must retain video monitoring for one year, which is costly. SMUD has about 300 surveillance cameras. It would cost it \$800,000 per year to store 25,5000 terabytes of data. Most special districts are not aware of this requirement and are not complying.
- Would allow agencies to share utility customer information under the CPRA, and the duty to hold certain information confidential would extend to the agency that is receiving the shared data.
- Request a Joint Resolution celebrating CSDA's 50th Anniversary to raise public awareness and understanding of special districts.
- Require test claim filing peri8ods to track with the fiscal year.

The committee voted to recognize Senator Mike McGui8re as Legislator of the Year.

CSDA conducted three Special District Tours for Legislative Staffers. Surveys were conducted before and after the tour On a scale of 1 to 10 they were asked to rate their knowledge of special districts (average rating before was 5.95 and after was 8.29); importance and/or value of special districts (average rating was 8.31 and after was 9.45)


